General Conditions

Except as otherwise provided by other special legal provisions and with a view to obtaining the academic degree that recognises them, admission to undergraduate courses is granted to students with either:

- A certificate of Further Secondary Education issued from the academic year 1993–1994 by a fully fledged secondary education establishment or a school of Continuing Education in the French Community and approved by the Board created for that purpose, and holders of the same certificate issued from the 1994 calendar year by the education board of the French Community;
- or a certificate of Further Secondary Education issued not later than the end of the school year 1992–1993 accompanied, for admission to degree-length undergraduate studies, by a proficiency diploma giving access to higher education;
- or a diploma issued by a higher education establishment of the French Community recognising an academic degree, or a diploma issued by a university institution or an establishment dispensing full-time higher education under previous legislation;
- or a higher education certificate issued by an improvement courses establishment;
- a pass certificate for one of the [entrance examinations](#) co-ordinated by the higher education establishments or by a French Community education board and whose curricula are approved by the Government after consultation, according to the sector, with the Interuniversity Council of the French Community (Conseil interuniversitaire de la Communauté française – CIUF) or the General Council of the Hautes Ecoles (Conseil général des Hautes Ecoles – CGHE); this certificate gives admission to studies in relevant sectors or fields;
- or a diploma, certificate or secondary school certificate similar to those mentioned above issued by the Flemish Community (this certificate does not give exemption from the [French Language Proficiency](#) exam), by the German-speaking Community or the Royal Military School;
- of a diploma, certificate or secondary school certificate outside Belgium and recognised as equivalent to those mentioned above.

Requests for equivalence must be submitted to the [Service des équivalences](#) of the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research of the French Community of Belgium before 15 July 2013.

Notes: the two following certificates are automatically recognised as equivalent to the Certificate of Upper Secondary Education (Certificat d'enseignement secondaire supérieur – CESS): the European baccalaureat issued by the High Council of European Schools; the international baccalaureate issued by the International Baccalaureate Office, Geneva.

However, neither certificate automatically gives exemption from the [French Language Proficiency](#) exam;

- or a proficiency diploma giving access to higher education (diplôme d'aptitude à accéder à l'enseignement supérieur – DAES) conferred by the French Community examination board.

Exam of knowledge of the French language

Anyone not demonstrating sufficient [French language proficiency](#) will not be admitted to the first-year undergraduate examinations.

Learning outcomes

The programme for the **Bachelor's degree in Modern Languages and Literatures** has two forms:

- German, Dutch and English (which combines two Germanic languages chosen from German, English and Dutch);
- General (which combines a Romance language with a Germanic one, chosen from either French, Spanish and Italian or German, English and Dutch).

By the end of the Bachelor's degree course (German, Dutch and English), students will:

- have gained productive and receptive skills, both oral and written, at a more advanced level (Level B2+ of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages) in both languages studied;
- have mastered the grammar of the languages they have studied as well as the foundations of linguistics in these languages;
- have acquired literary skills, in literary history as well as the analysis and interpretation of literary texts;
- have gained an understanding of the cultural and contemporary environment of the countries where the languages they have studied are spoken;
- be familiar with producing academic work in linguistics and literature.

Teaching method

The bachelors programme in Bachelor in Modern Languages and Literatures : German, Dutch and English begins with a common semester made up of general courses given within the faculty. These general courses are taught by a team of teachers who emphasize an active exchange involving practical work and student participation. This common semester provides students with the opportunity to change to another bachelors programme at the end of the January exam session if the student's advisory office agrees.


From the second semester of the first year on, the courses specific to the students' bachelors programme use a variety of pedagogical methods (active learning, a balanced combination of individual and group work) with the aim of acquiring knowledge and the ability to analyse.

Throughout the student's bachelor programme in Bachelor in Modern Languages and Literatures : German, Dutch and English, students experience a variety of teaching methods : lectures, group work, individual work, seminars. Some courses also use e-learning (exercises and resources are made available to students, pedagogical management, sharing and evaluation by the class of work).

Evaluation

Depending on the nature of the course and the teaching methods, the evaluation will take different forms. Some courses will involve oral and/or written evaluations (held during one of the three exam sessions: January – June – August/September), whilst the evaluation of seminars will involve more substantial student participation as well as assessment of individual course work. Evaluation methods will be explained at the beginning of each course.

Those exams relating to courses on communication skills will evaluate the student's level, i.e. the practical use of the language in relevant situations.

Teaching methods are evaluated in accordance with the current University regulations (see [General regulations concerning examinations](#) ). Students may also find additional information regarding the evaluation of courses in the course description.

Mobility and/or Internationalisation outlook

The Bachelor's programme of Bachelor in Modern Languages and Literatures : German, Dutch and English allows students to do a part of their studies abroad during their third year ([Erasmus](#), [Mercator](#)).

Programme structure

The bachelor programme in Modern Languages and Literatures: German, Dutch and English totals **180 credits over 3 years** (3 x 60 credits). It consists of a basic major syllabus of 150 credits and a minor syllabus of 30 credits (2 x 15 credits, over years 2 and 3).

Year 1 consists of a semester joint training course with general lectures covering the subjects taught by the Faculty.

From Year 2 onwards, the students are expected to broaden their intellectual and professional horizons by choosing a minor option of 30 credits, either from among other subjects taught in the Faculty or in another UCL Faculty, depending on any prerequisites laid down in these particular programmes.

Three pivotal courses make up the 150 credits of the **major orientation** of the bachelor syllabus:

- (1) methodological and disciplinary training in **Germanic languages and literature** chosen by the student (literary history, critical analysis of texts, syntax, linguistic considerations based on the languages studied, study of civilisations [historical data and contemporary scene]);
- (2) practicals in **oral and written communication** in the Romance and Germanic languages selected;
- (3) introduction to the **human sciences** (historical criticism, arts and civilisations, European literature, language science, philosophy, general linguistics, logic and argumentation, anthropology and psychology, religious sciences).
